The Master in European Contemporary History is designed to provide students with high-level education in European history, covering topics such as the political and socioeconomic aspects of the European integration process, the construction of social and cultural identity throughout Europe, European migration and Europe's relations with other global regions.

The Master in European Contemporary History encourages historical approaches to contemporary European issues and provides training on:

- how to understand European history and culture(s) beyond national frameworks
- how to develop a long-term perspective across periods
- how to critically assess global connections
- how to analyze and present historical findings using digital technologies.

Students can either specialise in "European history in the long term" or in "Social and political history of contemporary Europe".

The programme puts special emphasis on Digital Humanities and Public History. Students learn to use digital history tools and methodologies to transfer and adapt traditional narrating techniques and develop their own ways of telling (hi)stories, both for academic and non-academic audiences. The Digital History Laboratory allows students not only to get in touch with the latest research and technological advances in the area, but to develop their skills, leading to high-quality published projects.



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The programme trains experts in digital history.

Career perspectives

Successful completion of the programme will prepare for a career in European and international institutions and organisations, political and cultural institutions, media and cultural management, diplomatic services, senior civil appointments, secondary education, archives and libraries. The degree also prepares for an academic career (Phd).

Programme structure in 2022-2023

The curriculum covers a full-time two-year programme (120 ECTS) and is structured in modules covering different topics according to the chosen specialisation track and common core modules:

- **(Dé)coder l'histoire européenne:** Introduction to Digital History, Winter School in Digital History, skills in digital methods, Tutorat
- **Pratiques et perceptions du changement de l'Antiquité à l'époque moderne:** Concepts of change in the ancient world, Menaces sur l'ordre établi : pourquoi et comment les dynamiques de domination changent au Moyen Âge, A New World dawning? Political change since the Renaissance
- **Europe et les autres:** Les croisades entre Orient et Occident, d'hier à aujourd'hui, Europe and its Others (15th to 18th century), The Greeks and the others: the Orient in the Greek perception
- **Research seminar:** Public History (M2), The Soundscape of Modernity (M1)
- **Histoire de l'Europe aux XIX^{ème} et XX^{ème} siècles:** Gender, Sexualities, and Women's Studies in Modern Europe, Histoire des migrations (XIX^e-XXI^e siècle), Histoire économique et sociale de l'Europe après 1945
- **Débats, circulations et intégration:** Histoire de l'intégration européenne (1919-1993), Debating genocide and mass violence in the 21st century: Europe and beyond, Consumption, Consumer Culture and Identity in Contemporary Europe
- **Regards différés sur la construction européenne:** Histoire des coopérations transfrontalières en Europe, Mémoires européennes à l'ère numérique, Women and ICTs : an historical analysis
- **Optional classes :** Méthodologies historiques, Historiographie, Pratiques historiennes et métiers de l'histoire, Mapping the financial place in Luxembourg (1950s-2000s),
- **Master thesis**

Programme organisation

The programme is designed for a maximum of 25 students, facilitating problem-based learning approaches and individual coaching. Students benefit from close co-operation with other Master programmes in European Studies and Public History.
